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

Jigsaw Families

This term Bricknell Primary School launched their Jigsaw Families
Programme. 9 Family pairs joined Mrs Chapman and Miss Clay for 6 weekly
sessions on a Friday afternoon. The first cycle of the programme has been a
huge success and Mrs Chapman and Miss Clay have loved working with the family
pairs.

The Jigsaw Families programme follows a similar structure to the PSHE lessons the children have on a Friday afternoon across the whole school. These sessions are designed to look at all aspects of life and work on improving and building confidence and relationships within the home and school setting.

Showcasing our curriculum

Every year group enjoys an exciting, engaging and challenging curriculum that is planned to cover twelve week units. As well as developing a deep knowledge of the curriculum and a broad range of skills, the units are also underpinned by core aspects of our curriculum intent. Pupils demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of the curriculum in a range of ways. Many schemes of learning include a 'showcase' which the pupils prepare and perform to parents.





This term, Year 4's curriculum theme has been linked to World War II. This included an exciting trip to the Yorkshire Air Museum. Also, Year 4 invited parents in to school and hosted a showcase which included songs and performances and a presentation of their curriculum work and artwork. They even hosted a tea party where they served ration cake.

As core features of our school curriculum intent, the essential values of promoting ambition and celebrating diversity are covered and developed across the school day. As part of this, every Wednesday the school holds a whole school assembly that promotes these aspects of our school vision. Our Passionate Pupils

Our pupils are very passionate about improving the world around them and making a difference. Some children in Year 6 were shocked to discover how much sugar is contained in popular soft drinks and wanted to raise awareness of the health implications of drinking them.



The children produced a display that indicated the amount of sugar that is contained in a range of soft drinks. They then presented this to pupils at playtime and discussed the possible hard the drinks could do to our health.

The pupils also decided that it would be important to interview a dentist about the issue of sugar and the impact that it has on dental health. One of the dentists at the Lund Dental Practice on Beverley Road, Hull kindly gave up some of their time to meet with the children. Here are some of the questions the pupils, composed and asked, complete with the responses.

Why is it important for children to drink water instead of fruit juice or sugary drinks thorough-out the school day?

Sugar creates an acidic mouth which causes teeth to lose minerals. This causes tooth decay.

What percentage of children have tooth decay now as a result of drinking sugary drinks?

In 12 year-old children, 38.8% have decayed teeth or have a filling as a result of tooth decay.
