

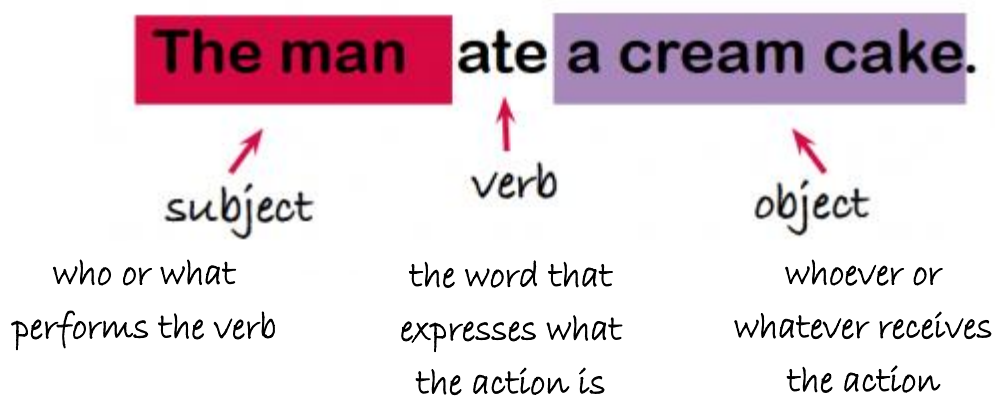

SUBJECT - VERB AGREEMENT
