Photographing Children

We understand that parents/carers like to take photos of their children or video them in the school play, at sports day or school presentations. This is a normal part of family life and we do not discourage you from celebrating your child's success.

However, there are restrictions on the use of images of children (e.g. data protection) and may be health and safety considerations. We adhere to the following guidelines:

- We seek written parental consent for the use of photographs and images for use by the school (including on our website and in brochures) when a child joins.
- If external visitors come to the school to make videos or take photographs for use outside the school, we will seek specific parental consent.
- We should be sensitive to the feelings of pupils who may be uncomfortable about being photographed and also be aware that placing images of some children on public forums or websites may put them at risk of harm so it is asked that any images of other people's children are not placed online.

Information for parents




Child Protection is an important subject in which all staff receive regular training. Our priority is to work with you but there may be times when we have to involve other people. Everybody has a responsibility to keep all children under the age of 18 safe. Bricknell Primary School has a statutory responsibility to share any concerns it may have about a child in need of protection with other agencies and in particular police, health and children's social care. Schools are not able to investigate concerns but have a legal duty to refer them. In most instances, the school will be able to inform the parents/carer of its need to make a referral.

However, sometimes the school is advised by children's social care or police that the parent/carer cannot be informed whilst they investigate the matter. We understand the anxiety parents/carers understandably feel when they are not told about any concerns from the outset. The school follows legislation that aims to act in the interests of the child.

Parents/Carers are the most important people at keeping their children safe. You should always:

- Feel confident to raise concerns about your child.
- Talk to us if you need help or support.
- Read our policies about safety issues.
- Let the us know if your child has a medical condition.
- Let the school know if there is a change in your circumstances such as a house move, a new contact number, a change of name, a change of parental responsibility.
- Inform us who will be dropping off or collecting your child and two other emergency contacts. You must inform us of any changes to agreed arrangements.
- Let the school know if you have any court orders relating to the safety of your child.
