This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. We are committed to increasing access for disabled pupils and supporting pupil with special educational needs. Teachers plan a bespoke curriculum for children who are working below age related expectations.

Time allocated per week for curriculum music



The National Plan for Music Education (NPME) recommend that school's timetable at least one hour each week of the school year for music throughout Key Stages 1 and 2.

We currently timetable of Music per academic year.

Year 4 access 1 hour per week of music lessons delivered by the Music Service.

All other year groups access 1 hour a week every other half term. This equates to 18 directed teaching hours.

- Key Stage 1 1 hour a week every other half term
- Key Stage 2 1 hour a week every other half term (apart from year 4)

Music curriculum

• Our music curriculum is informed by the <u>Model Music Curriculum</u> (<u>publishing.service.gov.uk</u>) (March 2021), non-statutory guidance for teaching music from Key Stages 1 to 2.

Opportunities for pupils during lesson time

- As a school, we provide the following opportunities for pupils to learn to sing or play an instrument during lesson time:
 - Percussion instruments: drums, tambourines, shakers, etc.
 - Tuned instruments: glockenspiel.
- Hull Schools WCET (Whole Class Ensemble Tuition) Year 4 Brass. All Y4 children learn to play a brass instrument using a P Buzz, with lessons delivered weekly by the Hull Music Service. Children attend and perform in an annual 'Celebration of Music' event in the summer term, along with schools across the city.

Partnerships

Hull Music Hub / named music education organisation (if applicable) support our music curriculum in the following ways:

• Weekly Brass lessons – Pupils in Year 4 learn to play a brass instrument.
